A Note From the Pastor

The field behind the church is vast and empty.

It used to sit there as the promise of a prosperous future imagined when First Christian Church would build bigger to accommodate all who would come to the Lord's Table to eat and be filled, be nurtured by the Spirit of the Living God and live lives of loving kindness in community as the First Christian Church of Bellingham.

What do we see now as it remains empty years after we have sold the property? Is it a reminder of big buildings to come in the form of more luxury and unaffordable apartments in a town that has desperate need of both housing and affordability.

What do you feel when you pull into the parking lot? A bit of sadness that the old dream didn't come to fruition? Melancholy in remembering those daysgone by? Relief that we are no longer teetering on the brink of bankruptcy or closed doors? Eagerness for the days ahead?

I see dandelions. A huge, beautiful field of dandelions. I gain an ear worm in the form of Five Iron Frenzy the Christian ska band hit from the late 1990's Dandelions every time I turn off Bakerview Road into the parking lot these days. Bright yellow flowers and the puff balls of white seeds ripe for making wishes, blowing with the wind to the farthest reaches of our area and taking root in fertile soil to bloom and grow some more.

His three-year-old excitement bubbling over, unable to wait until mommy had finished singing her first aria on the recital program.

An unscripted interruption of concert protocol and a deviation from the scenario I had imagined for my first big program? Sure. A Weed? Hardly! Those were flowers, all of it, I later realized.

This morning I sent my now grown son the picture of the field and a mushy, teary mom-message about the song, and flowers. He wrote back "Funny, momma, how we classify things in life as flowers or weeds and think that is true and not just our limited judgement or perception"

Holy One of Old, Creator and Planter of Dandelions, we do our best to give our best to you. Bless that effort, limited by our humanity though it may be. Search our hearts and know us; Create in us something beautiful for you and the World you still love. AMEN.

Faith Community Nurse

Greetings,

When choosing a health awareness focus for this month I am reminded that the beginning of the 2023-24 school year is here, and school districts continue to fund mental health services during the current budget shortfalls. My first school nurse position was at a high school and there were no school based mental health services. It was a time when the rate of adolescent suicide was rising and the Youth Suicide Prevention Program was the only program in Washington State training adults to bring this student-to-student program to schools. Over the next 17 years of school nursing, I continued to stay up to date on suicide prevention trainings, taught nurses and other school staff about mental health, suicide awareness and prevention and served on a youth mental health advisory board.

September is Suicide Awareness Prevention Month. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) campaign "Together for Mental Health," is a time to raise awareness of this stigmatized, and often taboo, topic. This month is a time to shift public perception, spread hope and share vital information to people affected by suicide. NAMI's goal is to ensure that individuals, friends and families have access to the resources they need to discuss suicide prevention and to seek help. This campaign encourages people to bring their voices together to advocate for better mental health care, which includes an effective crisis response system. NAMI worked hard to advocate for and prepare for the 988 nationwide number for people to call for mental health, substance use and suicide crises. This new number is an easy way that allows people to quickly connect with support during a crisis, 24/7, regardless of where they live.

The NAMI website has more information about this year's campaign to raise awareness, including the Individual and Community impact facts listed below:

- 79% of all people who die by suicide are male.
- Although <u>more women</u> than men attempt suicide, men are <u>4x</u> more likely to die by suicide.

- Suicide is the <u>2nd leading</u> cause of death among people aged 10–14 and the 3rd leading cause of death among people aged 15-24 in the U.S.
- Suicide is the <u>12th leading</u> cause of death overall in the U.S.
- 46% of people who die by suicide had a diagnosed mental health condition but research shows that 90% may have experienced symptoms of a mental health condition.
- Community Impact:
- Annual prevalence of serious thoughts of suicide, by U.S. demographic group:
- 4.9% of all adults
- 11.3% of young adults aged 18-25
- 18.8% of high school students
- 45% of LGBTQ youth
- The <u>highest rates</u> of suicide in the U.S. are among American Indian/Alaska Natives followed by non-Hispanic whites.
- Lesbian, gay and bisexual youth are <u>nearly</u> <u>4x</u> more likely to attempt suicide than straight youth.
- Transgender adults are <u>nearly 9x</u> more likely to attempt suicide than the general population.
- Suicide is the <u>leading cause</u> of death for people held in local jails.


